1. Who We Are

Action for Humanity Canada (AFHC) is a Canadian registered international humanitarian organisation committed to saving lives, alleviating suffering, and supporting the resilience of communities affected by conflict, disaster, and displacement. With active operations across the Middle East, Africa, and Asia, AFH has rapidly scaled its Sudan Mission in response to the unprecedented humanitarian crisis triggered by the 2023–2025 conflict.

In Sudan, AFHC focuses on emergency food security and nutrition, basic needs, communitybased protection, health, WASH, and psychosocial support, delivered through a hybrid model of direct implementation and local partnership with national NGOs, community committees, and state authorities.

2. Humanitarian Context

The conflict between the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) and the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) has severely destabilised South Kordofan, West Kordofan, and Blue Nile, driving widespread displacement, food insecurity, and protection risks. Across all three states, conflict-related displacement, climate shocks, and the collapse of markets and services have left vulnerable households without reliable access to food or basic services. Women and children are disproportionately affected, facing heightened risks of violence, exploitation, and unmet protection needs. The scale and complexity of the crisis require sustained, flexible humanitarian responses focused on food security, nutrition, and protection.

Sudan faces one of the world's worst crises:

- 30.4 million people need humanitarian assistance (AFH, 2025).
- 12 million people are internally displaced—the largest displacement crisis globally.
- South Kordofan, West Kordofan, and Blue Nile face severe access constraints, active hostilities, market collapse, and widespread displacement (ACAPS SubRegion Profile 2025).
- In Kadugli alone, 96% of IDPs cannot meet basic needs, with high malnutrition, food insecurity, and protection risks (DRC RNA, 2025)

AFHC's programming directly responds to these acute needs.



3. Where We Work

AFHC's operational approach is grounded in a strong understanding of conflict dynamics, access constraints, and population movement patterns across the Kordofan region. Our programmes are deliberately designed to remain viable in highly constrained environments characterised by:

- ✓ Active hostilities and shifting frontlines
- ✓ Road inaccessibility and seasonal flooding
- ✓ Suspension or restriction of NGO operations
- ✓ Limited crossline and cross-border access

South and West Kordofan continue to face severe movement restrictions, stranded aid convoys, and a rapidly narrowing access window ahead of the rainy season. (Market Assessment report: 2025) In response, AFHC prioritises community-based delivery models, the use of local volunteers, and fixed service points such as hospitals, enabling continuity of assistance where conventional supply chains are disrupted.

AFH has been delivering humanitarian assistance in Sudan since 2024, responding to the country's escalating conflict, widespread displacement, and acute food insecurity. Our programming focuses on immediate life-saving food assistance while laying the foundations for longer-term food security and community resilience.

Through close partnerships with local actors and community-based organisations, AFH operates in some of the most remote and challenging areas of South Kordofan and Blue Nile, targeting children, caregivers, and conflict-affected families. Interventions combine direct food provision with nutrition awareness, protection-sensitive approaches, and psychosocial well-being support.

Between 2024 and 2025, AFH's food security and nutrition programming in Sudan reached over **28,000** right holders through a combination of emergency feeding, community kitchen support, and nutrition education initiatives.



4. Our Technical Expertise

4.1 Emergency Food Security & Nutrition

- AFH has set up **10 community kitchens** across IDP camps in South Kordofan and Blue Nile
- **18,000 individuals** received two hot meals per day across five kitchens.
- **300 households** received food parcels.
- **300 malnourished** children received nutritional supplements through health facilities.
- MUAC screening shows dramatic improvements:
 - Kadugli: normal range increased 17.5% → 92%
 - Aldamazin: 76% → 98%

4.2 Health, PSS & Community WellBeing

- Daily psychosocial support sessions reaching **over 4,600 parents & children**.
- Parent training on child protection, hygiene, and nutrition.
- Hospital kitchen support with nutrition specialists, nurses, and MoH collaboration.

4.3 Community Engagement & Accountability

AFH prioritises localization and participation:

- 5 community committees representing women, youth, PWDs, MoH, HAC, and elders.
- Community-led registration, verification, monitoring, and feedback management.
- PSEA and safeguarding messages integrated into all awareness sessions.

5. Our Delivery Model

AFH's work in Sudan is underpinned by our ability to mobilise quickly, leverage strong community relationships, and maintain operational presence in volatile environments. Our programming combines direct service delivery (meals and kitchen operations) with capacity building (nutrition awareness, volunteer training) to maximise both short-term and long-term benefits.

We integrate safeguarding, gender inclusion, and accountability mechanisms into all activities, ensuring interventions are safe, dignified, and responsive to community feedback.

6. Risk Management & Compliance

AFHC applies robust risk mitigation measures:

- Security: site relocation, flexible scheduling, local crisis monitoring.
- Financial: FSPs, internal controls, partner reserve funds, transparent reporting.
- Market volatility: price monitoring, advance procurement, menu adjustments.
- Cultural norms: dignified verification alternatives and inclusive community committees.
- Safeguarding: mandatory training, PSEA messaging, accessible reporting pathways.

7. Why Partner with Action for Humanity Canada in Sudan

AFHC offers donors:

- ✓ Proven Delivery in High-Risk Environments - Operations sustained in Kadugli, Al Dalanj, and Aldamazin despite conflict, displacement, and market collapse.
- ✓ Strong Local Partnerships & Community Acceptance - MoH, HAC, community committees, women's associations, and local NGOs.
- ✓ Scalable, Localised Model - Rapid expansion possible through community and partner structures.
- ✓ Financial Accountability & Transparency - Detailed reporting and effective budget management across multiple donors.

8. Future Priorities

AFHC aims to scale support in:

- Emergency food security & nutrition
- Health and community-based PSS
- Cash-based assistance
- Women's livelihoods & resilience initiatives
- Local partner capacity-building

AFHC is actively engaging donors to widen geographic coverage and reach more highly vulnerable communities.


