Education

Education is the key to a better future. It helps people to increase their skills, fulfil their potential and pursue their goals. However, this basic human right is denied to millions of children and adults in many communities throughout the world. Action For Humanity always prioritises the needs of the most vulnerable children living in conflict areas and we helped over 100,000 students access education through our projects in 2021.

In 2021 we supported 154 schools across the globe by building new schools, rehabilitating existing ones, training teachers and providing educational materials.

Alongside education, we have integrated psychosocial support for out-of-school, displaced and host communities' children through creative mobile education interventions. These projects provide immediate and creative access to the most marginalised IDPs, host community children and young adolescents in a safe and protective learning environment.

Emergency Education Response to Internally Displaced Persons and Communities



Location: Idleb and Rural Aleppo, Syria

Sadly, school attacks have continued in Syria unabated, with more than 1 in 3 schools damaged or destroyed. The volatile environment has gravely impacted learning and associated retention for children enrolled in schools.

Action For Humanity aims to provide immediate educational access with integrated Psychosocial support for out-of-school, displaced and host communities' children in Idleb and Rural Aleppo through creative mobile education interventions. The project will provide immediate and creative access to the most marginalized IDPs, host community children and young adolescents in a safe and protective learning environment.

This mission will be achieved by launching two mobile education buses, through which we will be improving the access to education and quality of teaching to engage and appropriately support learners in their educational and psycho-social needs. It is worth mentioning that Action For Humanity is the first NGO that launched this initiative, covering 4000 out-of-school children in Syria. Action For Humanity will reach in total 12,044 beneficiaries.

Action for Humanity reached 720 children through the mobile bus intervention and 1,501 children through the mobile teacher modality.

Action for Humanity will reach 5,000 children in Jarablus through distributing 5,000 education kits to the most vulnerable children whose families do not have the financial capacity to cover these costs.

School Orchard for Children



Location: Nigeria

Nigeria has the second highest burden of stunted children in the world, with a national prevalence rate of 32% of children under five. An estimated two million children in Nigeria suffer from severe acute malnutrition but only two out of ten are currently reached with treatment.

The main composition of the Nigerian diet is carbohydrates. In the homes of people living in poverty (more than 65% of the population in northern Nigeria), a meal is often just carbohydrates with some vegetable sauce. There is little to no adherence to the nutritional advice of consuming sufficient fruits and vegetables for a healthy diet, in fact most children in targeted states eat fruit only once a week.

The planting of a school orchard will combat poor nutrition by adding fruit into the student's diet as well as providing the school with additional income through the sale of additional harvests. The project is an orchard containing 1,000 fruit trees for a school of approximately 600 students providing access to sufficient daily intake of fruits (2-3 per day). It will also bring additional benefits by providing the school with a more pleasant environment, students will gain training on setting up and caring for nurseries and tree orchards as well as contributing to local adaptation to climate change.

This holistic project not only improves the long-term diet and nutrition of students but benefits their families and wider community. The investment provides economic opportunity and contributes to the region's climate resilience.

University Students Support



Location: Jordan

This project will provide financial support to high-achieving Jordanian, Palestinian and Syrian students from low-income households. In Jordan, there are 2 semesters in every year and the average university course lasts up to 4 years. There is a tuition fee associated with every semester and the average tuition cost for 1 Year is 1,315 GBP. And for a typical 4 Year course, it will be 5,260 GBP.

LAILA'S STORY

“I love this place very much, because I am able to play and draw with my friends”

As with many of the other children, Laila has seen violence all her life. She has suffered from medium to severe issues of depression, characterised by a lack of self-confidence and habitual isolation.

Through the Psychosocial Support activities delivered by Syria Relief's Child Friendly Spaces (CFS) project, there has been a marked improvement in the child's emotional state, and a positive strengthening of self-confidence when dealing with others. Laila's parents believe that the CFS programme has helped her to cope with all the traumatic losses that she has suffered, such as losing close family and friends.



Health and Nutrition

Without access to adequate healthcare people are at risk of falling ill more frequently and the rate of mortality also increases. Action For Humanity aims to increase access of vulnerable families to healthcare facilities by working closely with local communities and by providing them with cash and other items. We are making health facilities and medication accessible for almost 300,000 people in Syria, Yemen and Lebanon.

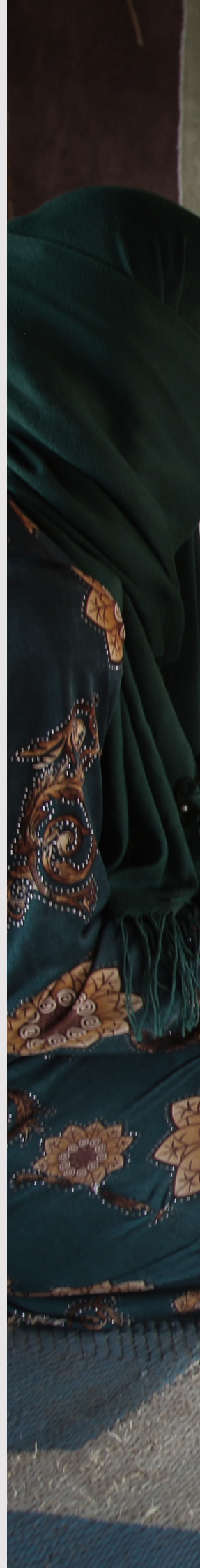
During 2021, Action For Humanity delivered critical health and nutrition services in Syria to more than 500 pregnant and lactating women, new-borns, and children under 5 with a focus on the first 1,000 days of life to protect, promote, and support lifesaving practices. We also continued our Mobile Clinic project that helped Syrian communities to improve preventive and curative health services, such as child immunisation and therapeutic care.

Both these projects provided training and awareness-raising sessions to local health workers and health committees to increase their knowledge of hygiene practices.

Action For Humanity continued our prosthetic project in 2021 and saw an increase in the number of patients receiving prosthetic limbs. The selected beneficiaries were amputees and the disabled. The patients were either injured during the conflict or had been otherwise impacted by the ongoing war.

Improve Post-Natal Services in Dohuk Maternal Health Hospital

Location: Dohuk, Iraq

Dohuk Maternal hospital is the only tertiary facility providing Maternal, pre- and post-natal services in Duhok governorate, Iraq. Yet, it is suffering from poor infrastructure and lack of medical equipment. The maternal and paediatric needs of this catchment area is only served through 23 Basic Emergency Obstetric and New-born Care services units (EMONC). These facilities need more support in terms of provision of equipment and improving infrastructure of Host Community, Refugees and IPDs.

In 2020, the hospital recorded of 17,785 deliveries among them 6,074 were c-sections and 720 infants needed incubators. In this regard, AFH will focus its intervention on Post-natal care throughout the provision of high-quality incubators to reinforce the efforts of the Hospital to accommodate more infants. The intervention will be conducted in coordination with Duhok Directorate of Health, which will provide the technical specifications for the incubators.

Health and Nutrition Mobile Clinics

Location: Syria

Action For Humanity's Health and Nutrition Mobile clinic has seen a gradual increase in the number of beneficiaries in 2021 around 24,000 beneficiaries received health and nutrition services through mobile clinics at camps, while there were 12,000 beneficiaries in the first half of 2022, due to the escalation of violence in Northern Syria, this number is expected to increase significantly over the coming months.

The selected beneficiaries are internally displaced person's affected during the conflict or have been impacted by the ongoing war. They are in dire need of primary health care and nutrition services, in addition to providing health care for pregnant and lactating women.

Action For Humanity with the help of its donors will provide support to cover the expenses of 2 Health and nutrition mobile clinics for a period of one year with the intention of continuing. The funding for one year will contribute to the cost of providing internal, paediatric, gynaecology, and outreach activities. Action For Humanity has successfully initiated the health and nutrition mobile clinics project and would benefit greatly with additional funding to reach more people in need. There will be 2 doctors, 2 midwives, 2 nurses, pharmacists, a Nutrition counsellor, and providing the essential support to the running of the mobile clinics.

Fighting COVID-19; Mechanical Ventilator (Respiratory Machine) for ICUs in Hospitals

Zakat Eligible

Location: Syria

Syria has entered its 10th year of conflict. The health sector has been badly damaged with only a few hospitals fully functional. Most of them are running on low staff and without basic equipment. With the spread of COVID-19, the people of Syria are left more vulnerable without the facilities required to fight against this disease.

Moderate to severe cases of patients suffering from COVID-19 require intensive care treatment in hospitals and depend on ventilators to stay alive. Some patients fighting COVID-19 will die because there are not enough devices to accommodate all patients. Action For Humanity is raising funds to not only provide hygiene and health care kits along with awareness to curtail the spread of the virus but is also aiming to provide existing hospitals with mechanical ventilators to help decrease the death rate in the country.

Work in UK

We have continued the 'Tameside Emergency Covid Response' campaign since the start of the COVID-19 crisis and are providing 150-300 hot meals per week for outreach services across Tameside and Manchester for the homeless. So far over 30,000 meals have been prepared, cooked and delivered. While also building local food security capacity by training around 100 volunteer community cooks weekly.

We also provide 'basic essentials' support for the vulnerable, elderly and refugees in the UK. Recently, our efforts included facilitation of new clothes for Afghan refugees with the help of the UK Home Office. We are also working with local cluster on both, the Covid Response and the Afghan refugee crisis. We want to ensure that Action For Humanity is recognised as key players in any local response that is benefitting our community.

Dialysis Machine for Hospitals in Syria



Location: Idleb, Syria

As the Syrian crisis approaches its eleventh year, the health system remains heavily disrupted. While attacks on health care in 2020 fell by 67%, the COVID-19 pandemic, coupled with economic downturn in the country, has pushed the health system to the brink. In 2021, only 58% of hospitals and 53% of primary health care centres were fully functional.

The cost of health services, lack of medicines and fear of exposure to COVID-19 has replaced distance, overcrowding and long wait times as the main self-reported barriers to health access. 86% of surveyed households who sought health services in the previous three months reported having to pay out-of-pocket for care.

This project will directly help patients who need dialysis treatment and cannot afford them. AFH will procure and donate a dialysis machine to a hospital in Idleb (where most needed) and will cover the cost of machine's operation for 8 patients for one year.

Providing Life-Saving Neonatal Care to Children and Mothers

Location: Idleb, Syria

Recent studies from the Gaziantep Nutrition Cluster have shown that at least 200,000 children (under the age of 5 years), pregnant women & lactating mothers (PLW) have been displaced in northwest Syria and are in urgent need of neonatal care.

Action For Humanity delivers critical health and nutrition services in Idleb and Aleppo governorate, focusing on pregnant and lactating women, new-borns, and children under 5 with a focus on the first 1000 days of life to protect, promote, and support lifesaving practices. The programme provides access to lifesaving health and nutrition services through its previous and current support within local maternity hospitals, primary health centres, nutrition centres, mother-baby areas, and extended outreach services. The nutrition programme also has a stronger focus on building capacity of health, nutrition and outreach workers to ensure that basic health and nutrition services are extended at household level, to ensure support to the most vulnerable and immobile.

The project activities aim to reduce maternal and neonatal morbidity and mortality through the provision of antenatal care (ANC), safe delivery, early initiation of breastfeeding, and postnatal care (PNC). Services will be provided through the RH units/clinics within the supported nutrition centres. Action For Humanity will train midwives on refreshing IYCF (Infant and young child feeding) concepts and best practices with a special focus on early initiation of breastfeeding and skin-to-skin contact, including within the first few hours after delivery.

Changing Lives - One Prosthesis at a Time



Location: Syria

Action For Humanity Prosthetic Centre has seen a gradual increase in the number of patients waiting to receive prosthetic limbs. In 2020 around 50 patients were added every month on the waiting list and due to the escalation of violence in Northern Syria, this number is expected to increase significantly over the coming months.

The selected beneficiaries are amputees and the disabled, either injured during the conflict or have been impacted by the ongoing war. They are in dire need of artificial limbs, orthopaedic devices, and long-term rehabilitation care. Action For Humanity with the help of its donors will provide support to cover the expenses of the Prosthetic Centre for a period of one year with the intention of continuing. The funding for one year will contribute to the cost of providing artificial limbs, orthopaedic devices, and long-term rehabilitation.

Action For Humanity has successfully initiated the prosthetic limbs project and would benefit greatly with additional funding to reach more people in need. There will be 4 technicians and 2 technician assistants providing the essential support to the running of the centre.

SALEH'S STORY

“Thank you so much Syria Relief for all the support provided through this difficult time”

Saleh is a 12-year Syrian child, who lost his right foot below the knee because of a mine explosion near his house in 2018.

Action For Humanity helped Saleh through several surgeries and provided him with prosthetics and drugs needed for his recovery. Saleh can now walk again and has gained his confidence back after suffering from a traumatic injury.



Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH)

Clean water is essential for life and proper sanitation is critical to good health but around the world there are large disparities in access to these basic services. Action For Humanity aims to increase access to safe, clean drinking water and sanitation facilities.

In 2021, we reached 570,094 people by working closely with local communities on water, sanitation, and hygiene projects. We supported the population of 18,500 IDPs living in 19 camps in Syria's Harim, Maaret and Misrin districts by providing them with adequate amount of clean water through trucks and rehabilitating water and latrine supplies.

We installed water wells in Bangladesh, as well as Syria. These wells were built in areas that suffered from low levels of potable drinking water, high percentages of chloride in the underground water and shortages of electricity. The water extracted by Action For Humanity from the wells was channelled to refugee and IDP tents through water pipelines.

Supplying Syrian People with Water

Location: Syria

According to the WASH cluster, one-person daily needs 35 litres of water. Action For Humanity with help of its donors will support 16 water stations in North West Syria with operational materials.

We aim to reach 40,000 Families (about 240,000 Individuals) on a daily basis for six consecutive months. 16 Water Stations will provide 800 Families/4,800 IDPs with 50 litres per Individual.

Water Well for Rohingya Refugees

Special Request

Sadaqah Jariyah

Location: Cox Bazar, Bangladesh

In 2017, an exodus of Rohingya Muslims from Myanmar led to 1.3 million refugees arriving in neighbouring Bangladesh. Action For Humanity, responded with immediate emergency aid, followed by the implementation of longer-term programmes. At the heart of this is the provision of clean and safe water for drinking and domestic use.

Action For Humanity will dig a water well in Bangladesh for the Rohingya Refugees. The extracted water will be channelled to 50 refugee tents through water pipelines, helping more than 150 people.

The project includes equipment and installation e.g. Grinder Pumps, Wire, Hose, Rope Generator, Stainless Mesh Volt Convertor, Battery Solar Panels, Cables, Stand, Pipes, Labour Cost etc.

Sustainable Well Rehabilitation in Yemen

Sadaqah Jariyah

Location: Lahj, Yemen

The project aims to provide more than 5,600 people with critical access to safe drinking water in the Tuban district, Hrran village, through the rehabilitation of a major water source and increasing sustainability through the provision of solar power. The project will also address gaps in WASH through social behaviour change and community mobilization. The need has been shared by the community and local authorities with AFH staff and was highlighted in recent partners' reports.

The Hrran water source has been consistently reducing its output due to the lack of maintenance and fuel, and it requires a new water pump and solar power to function properly and meet people's needs. The increased numbers of IDPs added to the problem and addressing this issue is becoming more critical by the day.

AFH has done all the needed assessments and is in the process now to do a major rehabilitation for the water well and pump which are in severe conditions. If the well stops working, more than 5,000 people will have no access to safe drinking water which will create a disaster at the community level. With support from donors, AFH will be able to immediately rehabilitate and restore the proper functional capacity of this well for the long term. The community has managed to support minor rehabilitation efforts to keep the well working for over 10 years but now with the absence of any government support, the community is no longer able to keep such efforts.

Solar Powered Water Wells in Pakistan



Location: Tharparkar, Pakistan

Water is a basic necessity; it is unimaginable to live without water. Sadly 790 million people worldwide lack access to water. Women and children are forced to travel long distances on foot each day in difficult terrains to fetch clean water.

In the context of Pakistan, families living especially in the far-flung areas have to travel in the sizzling summer of Sindh to fetch water. In most of the cases it is the women, adolescent girls and children who are assigned the responsibility of collecting water for the whole family. This not only affects the health of the women and girls but the attendance of children in schools is badly affected too. Tharparkar is one such area located in the Sindh Province of Pakistan where majority of the villages do not have access to clean drinking water.

By providing an accessible water source, time and effort used in walking long distances to fetch water are no longer required. Access to clean water, further reduces the risk of disease and contamination. This results in better health as well as increased attendance of children in the school.

AFH proposes to build solar powered water wells in 6 locations in District Tharparkar. Since Tharparkar is a desert, there is never a shortage of sunlight. Powered by the sun's energy, one solar-powered water well can provide a sustainable source of water for a whole village. Solar water wells are automated through an internal motor that is powered via the sun's solar energy.

Solar Powered Water Well in Somalia



Location: Baidoa, Somalia

Water scarcity and sanitation is a huge issue in Somalia, with nearly all rural communities using unprotected water sources. These ponds, open shallow wells and rivers are used by humans and animals alike and along with poor sanitation can spread waterborne diseases such as cholera. Furthermore, access to clean water is only getting harder as Somalia is badly affected by flooding and drought. In drought-affected areas of Somalia, women must walk miles to find water, risking violence or animal attack, in order to sustain their families and animals. They do this with the knowledge that the dirty water they have collected may well make their children very ill.

The building of a solar well will allow the Baidoa villages in Somalia to harness its most abundant resource of sunlight to provide clean water. The construction of a 100m deep solar well with two taps will provide 30,000 litres of clean water for domestic drinking, cooking, and laundry for the 500 inhabitants of the Baidoa villages. Not only will this allow people access to the water they need and contribute to making waterborne diseases a thing of the past, it will free up the time of women and children for work, study and play.

Food Security and Livelihoods

Action For Humanity tackle starvation, food insecurity, malnutrition, and poverty through the provision of food and the opportunities and resources needed for people to generate income for themselves and their family. We implement food security and nutrition projects through a holistic approach in sure to deliver sustainable solutions.

One of our most successful projects in 2021 involved vocational training on plant nursery management in Syria. This project trained 300 beneficiaries on plantation and distribution of new olive trees. The households also received a monthly cash grant to cover their basic needs while they take care of the new plants. Food-for-work and cash-for-work projects are also key areas within our programme that we continue to support, mainly during emergency situations.

Micro Gardening for Women Refugees



Location: Lebanon

The situation of labour markets in Lebanon were already difficult and unfavourable before the Syrian crisis and the influx of Syrian refugees to Lebanon. The Lebanese market suffers from: high unemployment rates, mismatches between labour supply and demands, and a prevalence of both low quality and low-productivity jobs.

Today, refugees are found trapped in their tents unemployed and unable to access food. The majority report no income because of a lack of job opportunities. It is expected that the situation will deteriorate in case the problem is not addressed and monitored correctly.

Hence, Action For Humanity with the help of its donors plans to build capacity in the Microgardening sector and business for vulnerable Syrian women refugees.

Economic Empowerment of Marginalized Women in Gaza



Location: Gaza, Palestine

This project will provide emergency assistance to struggling and marginalised families in Gaza, headed by women, through the provision of skills and small income generating projects so they become self-reliant.

AFH will achieve this by enabling 40 impoverished families to become self-reliant and food secure through developing the skills of the women in the household so they can manage and operate a small business and earn an income. Furthermore, AFH will also provide these families with in-kind grants based on the available resources and experience.

Food Security



Sustain Livelihoods of Families by Reviving Syrian Olive Tree Farms



Location: Syria

This project aims to target the most vulnerable Olive farmer families in Northern Syria with Olive value chain support including:

- Support agriculture inputs such as organic fertilizers and pesticides to achieve full production with highest quality.
- Support activities regarding picking, pruning, grafting, weeding, oil extracting and supplementary irrigation to decrease the production cost and increase the profitability of olive farming in Syria.
- Support how to do /learning by doing approach regarding integrated olive management and agriculture good practices through farmers field schools' mechanism to promoted quantity and quality aspects.
- Support female headed households' farmers with income generating activities through agro-food processing inputs and capacity building in the related field to create a new job opportunity and secure a stable income for these families.
- Establishing inspiration centers for environment-friendly products regarding compost and firewood production from the olive by-products sector to increase profitability and sustain/reserve natural resources.
- Vocational training on plant nursery management. These beneficiaries will be trained on planting new olive trees and distributing them to new farmers to increase the number of olive trees in Syria.

Before the Syrian Crises, olive trees constituted about 66% of the total fruit trees in Syria and covered approximately 11.54% of the cultivated area. Their share was of 28% of the total production of fruit trees and contributed to 3.5% of the national income and 9% of the agricultural income.

Olive cultivation in Syria is considered a basic agricultural option for dry and semi-arid regions, and it guarantees a sustainable form of land use, in addition to its role in providing employment (as it contributes to employing more than 20% of the total workforce), and provides the necessary inputs for the industry associated with this sector. It also provides a basic food item from the food basket in Syria (table olives and olive oil).

Income Generation and Small Business Support to Affected Communities in Yemen



Location: Taiz, Yemen

Due to the severe economic conditions in Yemen, most families have lost access to basic income-generating and livelihood projects that used to cover their minimum standard of dignified living. The steep fall of the local currency and the collapsed economic conditions made families extremely vulnerable and highly dependent on humanitarian assistance. They remain also unable to meet their basic needs like food, medicines and education.

Women head of households have been among the most vulnerable during the conflict, and historically before in the Yemen context. Due to the ongoing conflict, many male members of the family either died on the frontlines or have lost their means of livelihood. Women, by default, have become the lead members of the family while having little to no access to means of support.

The Livelihoods Restoration project will help families restart their means of income generation and previous livelihoods activities to re-launch small-scale business enterprises. With support from our donors, AFH will assist more than 500 families in some of Yemen's most impoverished areas like Aden, Taiz, Abyan, Lahj and Aldhale'e by providing assets and cash vouchers along with the necessary business training to ensure these families can retain and improve the provided grants. Women head of households will be prioritized as they remain among the most affected – but capable of taking adequate care of family needs. It will also strengthen the role of women in the target community as they will have access to stronger representation in local councils and other community forms that are known to be male-dominated.

Location: Lahj, Yemen

The honey market is significant inside Yemen as well as in the neighbouring Gulf States and Saudi Arabia. Honey is considered a miraculous medicine, and culturally, honey is a necessary part of the diet. Yemeni honey has anti-bacterial properties and an excellent reputation for being medicinal. Wholesale traders collect honey from small producers and repackage it for markets in the urban centres or export it to neighbouring countries in the Arabia peninsula and Africa. People of this trade have not been able to continue even minimal levels of production due to the significantly increased prices of honey equipment and the deteriorated conditions of the country. This is in addition to many of these families being displaced or facing challenging circumstances to meet their essential expenses like food and medicine, which in turn has forced them to sell their equipment or lose the capacity to maintain them – leading to their demise.

With support from our donors, AFH will assist over 500 heads of household by immediately restoring their means of livelihood which includes the necessary equipment (beehives, livestock, etc.) and provide the needed training to build their resilience.

Improve Livelihoods of Farmers in Somalia



Location: Somalia

The majority of the Somali communities depend on livestock and livestock production for their livelihoods. However, drought, conflict and human and animal diseases has seriously affected the livelihoods of many Somalis. This project will stabilise food security and nutrition of 1000 households in Afgoye through the provision of seasonal appropriate seeds and animal health interventions.

The project will distribute 10 MT of cowpea seeds or 10 MT of white sorghum to 1000 agro-pastoral farmer households. These drought hardy crops will improve the food security of the households and the local community as a whole. Furthermore, leaves of cowpea and sorghum will be used to feed livestock, ensuring the sustainability of the project. In addition, the project will train 500 pastoralists on livestock health, vaccination and better livestock rearing practices and train and equip 50 community-based animal health workers. Through ensuring the health of livestock, this project will protect farmers against health or climate-induced problems, ensuring better economic stability and improved food security for the wider community.

Livelihood Support for Fishermen in Aden



Location: Aden, Yemen

In Aden and the southern region, fishermen have been gradually facing greater challenges to feed their families from their only source of income, fishing. The ongoing conflict has reduced the capacity of the community to buy fish and similar products and added to the lack of public services and government support. The fishing sector is usually dominated by larger fishing companies that have no regard for overfishing. The practice of commercial and non-commercial fishing on large scale has continued to deplete fishery by catching so many adult fish that not enough remain to breed and replenish the population as timely as before.

With support from our donors, AFH aims to improve the food security and resilience of approximately 3,000 people (400 households) for the most vulnerable groups in Aden governorate by focusing on restoring their critical means of income generation and livelihood. The project will provide emergency grants that cover lost or degraded fishing equipment for head-of-household fishermen, who as a result of worsened conditions, have either lost their means of generating income or experienced a drastic impact on their food security and livelihood. The grants will restore the minimum capacity for the target families to allow them to reach better food consumption scores and improve coping mechanisms.

Urgent Support to Palestinian Farmers



Location: Gaza, Palestine

The period between 10-21 May 2021 witnessed a new Israeli assault on Gaza by Israeli military forces. According to the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) ; 253Palestinians, including 66 children and 39 women were killed. Almost 2,000 Palestinians were injured during the hostilities, including over 600 children and 400 women, some of whom sustained severe injury and may suffer from a long-term disability requiring rehabilitation.

This project is a humanitarian, lifesaving, and rights-based intervention, which will prevent further erosion of livelihood assets, through providing a coping mechanism to the communities most badly affected by the blockade, poor economic conditions and last assault against Gaza in May 2021.

Households 'dependent on agricultural livelihoods –including 30,000 families of farmers, herders, and fishers –have all suffered debilitating damage and losses. This includes virtually all types of assets needed to generate an income from agriculture and supply local markets with food, such as farmland, greenhouses, wells, herds, animal sheds, boats, fishing gear and food processing plants. This is a critical issue given agriculture used to be the only productive sector contributing to minimising food insecurity among the people of Gaza.

This project will rehabilitate and plant 74 acres of land, and 37 farmers out of those their farms were destroyed in the last assault will be equipped with all necessary agricultural inputs to return to work and restore their lands' productivity and their livelihoods.

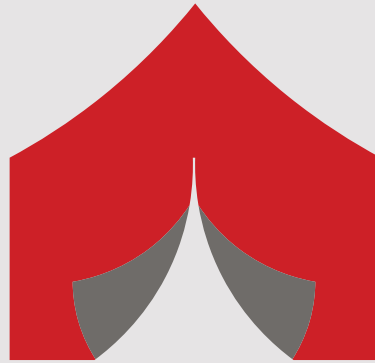
Food Security



Shelter and Camp Coordination Management

Through our shelter projects, we aim to empower people to achieve a life of dignity and security as well as resilience to climate change and natural disasters. We establish both long and short-term accommodation for some of the most vulnerable families in the hardest-to-reach areas.

In 2021, 1.5 million Syrians were displaced by the conflict, with the total number of IDPs now reaching 6.1 million people inside Syria. To help these displaced people Action For Humanity coordinated with local authorities to attain land, distribute 623 tents to homeless Syrian refugees and rehabilitate more than 700 tents in the Aleppo governorate.

ABDULLAH'S STORY

Abdullah is one of the millions of Syrian refugees living on the Lebanese side of the Syrian border. During the winter his tent was damaged by torrential rain and wind leaving his family exposed to the freezing temperatures.

Action For Humanity repaired Abdullah's tent and 70 others in that camp as part of the tent rehabilitation programme in Bekka Valley. Now Abdullah's family do not have to pay for the tent to be resheeted and have the protection they need from the winter elements.



Family Sponsorship

Action For Humanity has led the way in providing life-changing support for displaced and refugee Syrian families, who have been forced to flee to makeshift camps with limited access to food, water and the basic essentials that are needed to survive. With no opportunities to work, families are unable to break free from the spiraling cycle of poverty in which they are trapped.

Our support helps these vulnerable families fulfill their basic needs, including rent, food, drinking water, primary health care, basic education, and clothing. Our beneficiaries are refugees, who are not supported by any other organisation. Priority is given to families with the poorest health status, disabilities, female headed households and large families with young children.

“I am happy here; I like to come every day to play with my friends”

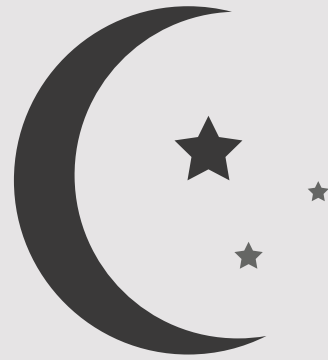
Ahmed is an orphan who has suffered with issues resulting from a lack of emotional care from his parents not being present in this formative stage of his life. Ahmed's parents passed away during the conflict and he is currently living with his guardian. It is believed by the protection team that his situation, coupled with the trauma from living through the war, has caused a lack of self-confidence and willingness to voice emotions. Currently Ahmed is part of the Child Friendly Spaces (CFS) project and is attending regular sessions. Since starting these sessions, staff have noticed an improved willingness in Ahmed to take part, and more confidence. Ahmed is now much better at communicating emotionally and interacting with his peers.



Seasonal

Our seasonal projects ensure that the most vulnerable are able to cope with the seasonal changes during the year and celebrate the holy month and religious festivals alongside the hardship of conflict and poverty. Our seasonal projects include Ramadan and Eid ul Adha. Food packages are provided to families during Ramadan as well as Eid gifts to orphans and disadvantaged children.

Iftar meals are distributed to fasting families. Qurbani meat is distributed during Eid ul Adha. During the winter season, essential items including warm clothes, fuel and food is distributed to vulnerable families affected by war and poverty.

Every year during Ramadan, Action For Humanity contributes to mitigating the suffering of the most vulnerable people by distributing nutritionally balanced food packs and hot meals (Iftar and sahoor). Eid gifts are also distributed to children in refugee and IDP camps. AFH assures that these items are locally procured and distributed in informal Internally displaced (IDP) settlements, camps and collective shelters. Carefully selected local suppliers complete the process of packaging, closely monitored by our teams in the field to ensure quality. Each basket contains nutritional food items which are selected following the food cluster standards. AFH aims to complete all food parcel distributions before the start of the holy month of Ramadan.

Emergencies

Yemen Emergency Appeal

Location: Yemen

For six years the war in Yemen has trapped families in a brutal cycle of starvation and sickness. Tens of thousands have been killed and two million displaced. The United Nations have warned that food scarcity in Yemen could lead to the worst famine in 100 years, with 20 million civilians at risk of extreme hunger unless they receive urgent humanitarian aid. A child dies every 10 minutes from malnutrition and other preventable diseases.

The country has faced the worst famine in a century, widespread cholera, and the most urgent humanitarian crisis in the world. And now, Covid-19 has hit a population which was already extremely vulnerable, resulting in more than four times the deaths from the disease than the global average. The World Health Organisation predicts that more than half of the entire population of Yemen will contract Covid-19. With only half the medical facilities operational the people of Yemen urgently need support.

We have recently distributed 362 food baskets to some of the most vulnerable families in Yemen in Zi Mar, Sana'a, Amanit Al Asima, Lahj, Aden and Abyan governorate helping over 1,810 people. We also provided Qurbani meat to 1,800 vulnerable households in addition to food packs to 50 households.

Rebuilding Communities

Adequate shelter is a fundamental human right. But across the globe, 80 million people are displaced from their homes, many of whom live in dire conditions and lack access to basic necessities such as cooking equipment and sanitation facilities.

Action For Humanity is committed to ensuring that all people have a safe home that provides dignity and security. Our wide range of shelter projects are designed to empower people and strengthen resilience to climate change and natural disasters.

It is not just homes that are lost through displacement crises. So too are key facilities such as schools, hospitals and places of worship. Action For Humanity is committed to rebuilding these facilities so that all displaced communities are able to thrive.





Build a Mosque



Location: Nigeria, Chad, Ghana, Guinea and/or Benin.

Mosques act not as just essential places of worship but as community hubs, places of education, learning and sharing in rural Africa. Our Mosque Building Initiative in Africa aims to build Mosques for up to 1000 persons and reaching many more in areas where people often have no place to practice or perform prayer. This project will fund the building of Mosques in rural and remote areas of Nigeria, Chad, Ghana, Guinea and/or Benin. These well-built and fully equipped Mosques will provide a much-appreciated place of worship for the community.

Rebuilding Syria

With the Syrian crisis completing its 10th year, over 13.1 million people are in need of humanitarian aid, with the number of displaced reaching 12.3 million. Out of this, 6.7 million people are homeless and displaced inside Syria with many left living in perpetual conflict zones. Families are either living in makeshift camps or dilapidated and damaged buildings leaving them - especially women and children - extremely vulnerable.

Action For Humanity aims to establish a permanent and safe solution for these families in the form of 1000 homes through a large scale and holistic residential project in Northern Syria. These 2-bedroom 37 metres squared concrete homes include all infrastructure and amenities i.e., electricity, sewage and potable water etc. required for one family. The project has been implemented in an area of approximately 550,000 square metres for over 5000 homeless Syrian families. The village will also include establishments of a school, community centre, hospital, shopping centre and mosque for the residents. The images below are what the finished project will look like with families able to move in immediately. Syria Relief aims to raise at least 1.6 million to successfully initiate and complete this project.

Location: The area of Al-bab, in northern Syria is under Turkish control giving the region stability and its residents security. There are many homeless Syrian families in Al-bab due to the security it provides - these families are in need of permanent homes. There are also connections with main roads and 3 networks in the area which ensures urban connectivity for the residents in terms of linkages to livelihoods.

We have already completed the Phase 1 of this project and we are planning to move 250 families into their new homes before the end of Ramadan 2022.



Building Houses in the Community

Each house will be built with the cost of £1600. This will include all the supporting amenities e.g. electricity, sewerage and water which are further explained below:

Design and construction:

The structural system is based on concrete columns and local materials will be used for the exterior and cladding. The project will aim to provide residential blocks in line with the local architecture without exceeding three floors.

1. The housing units constructed are based on submerged cement, topped by a pillar of reinforced concrete. The walls are made of concrete blocks and the roof is reinforced with concrete.
2. The floors of the housing unit will be tiled.
3. Each housing unit has one main metal door and a window with metal protection from the outside. The bathrooms will be internally insulated with aluminium and metal frame from the outside.
4. The housing unit is equipped with a drinkable water network in the kitchen and bathroom and drained with a PVC drainage system.
5. The housing unit will be equipped with electrical wiring (light points + sockets).
6. Each room in the housing unit will be equipped with a fireplace.

Sustainability and local impact:

The design of the project with all its services and infrastructure considers future use in terms of the possibility of expanding and connecting to any future infrastructure serving the region.

1. The roads in the project will be linked to the road network in the area.
2. The sewage network will be designed keeping in mind expansion with accessibility to links with the local network.
3. The water network will be equipped to work in both a connected and individual manner from the local water network, again keeping long-term sustainability in mind.
4. The electricity network will be equipped with solar energy connected to each residential unit or main generator and equipped to connect to the public network.
5. An integrated garbage collection and disposal system will be developed to serve the entire project.
6. The project will use local materials and local market through labour or building materials which manufactured locally, that will create jobs throughout the project duration.

Establishment of a Mosque in the Community

The project will also include a mosque for the residents. This will enable the residents to perform their religious obligations and rituals and it will enhance the spiritual wellbeing of the war-affected people. The mosque is designed with a maximum capacity of 1,200 beneficiaries, with an area of 940 square metres, divided into two floors.

Establishing Schools in the Community

A primary school and a secondary school will also be established as part of the project. These schools will serve about 1,000 boys and girls through separate shifts, to accommodate the largest number of students in the region.

The school is designed with the following criteria:

1. Supportive services for education with lecture halls, laboratories and playing areas.
2. A playground designed to serve more than one sporting activity.
